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

### PRESIDENT'S ITEMS

**Acting Pres. String** pointed out that the Club is committed to its annual subscription fees to RI; and in the event of a member resigning, he or she is still responsible for a year's fees. He thanked Stephen, Biffy and Gordon for putting together the Club's new website.

### **BUSINESS MEETING**

**Jackie** gave us a Power Point presentation on "Future Visions: a Foundation for the Future." It is RI's new model, replacing the current formats of Matching Grants, GSE teams, Foundation Scholars etc. It is intended to streamline TRF programmes, increase a sense of ownership and strengthen the impact of Club projects. Projects must benefit the targeted

community well after the grant has been distributed. Grants will be split into District and Global responsibility. Areas of focus should embrace:

- Peace and conflict prevention and resolution
- Disease prevention and treatment
- Water and sanitation
- Maternal and child health
- Basic education and literacy
- Economic and community development

The GSE programme will fall away and be replaced by a vocational training scheme with a team leader and a minimum of 3 members. It will be a Club-led initiative, not District; and it need not be a reciprocal agreement.

**Dottie** reported back on the project with Rotaract at Isiphiwo on Saturday 29<sup>th</sup> Sept. From all accounts a very successful and enjoyable occasion.

**Pam** said that with the passing on of Pat Wild, the position of Chairman of the Lavender Hill committee is vacant. Nominations for the position will be welcome.

**Biffy** advised that equipment has now been put into the Isiphiwo library as part of a pilot project together with Lavender Hill. Both schools now urgently need librarians to run it.

**Dennis** reported back for the NLC: Die Duine Primary School has been selected as one among 27 other primary schools in South Africa to have a completely new school built to the cost of R27 million. The building has already started and is estimated to be ready by 2014. Fairmount Secondary School this last year had a pass rate of 87% for matric, which was up 15% from the year before. In appreciation of this, the Department of Education donated R1 million to the school to be used for the benefit of all.

**Graham** suggested that death notices from the Club for Ron Davies and Pat Wild should be published. The Caring Committee (Ken Williams) will handle this.
