WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT FATS

We have all heard that certain fats are worse for us than others, but why?

Recently there has been an outcry about trans fats, also known as trans unsaturated fatty acids (TUFA) and this product has recently been banned in the State of New York.

All fats consist of chains of carbon and hydrogen atoms linked together. Saturated fatty acid (SFA) has the maximum amount of hydrogen attached to each carbon atom and are thus fully saturated with hydrogen, which makes them solid at room temperature for example lard and butter.

Unsaturated fatty acids (UFA) lack some hydrogen atoms and therefore there are some double bonds between the carbon atoms, for example liquid oil. UFA is further divided into mono unsaturated fatty acid (MUFA), which has only one double bond, or polyunsaturated fatty acids (PUFA) which has more than one double bond.

Now TUFA is a particular kind of unsaturated fatty acid with hydrogen atoms on each side of the double bond. TUFA is produced by bacteria in the stomachs of cows and sheep and can also be produced from vegetable and fish oil by a process known as hydrogenation. With this process, hydrogen atoms are forced onto the spare carbon double bonds of unsaturated fat. This makes the oil more solid at room temperature and more stable. This is then used by manufacturers to lengthen the shelf life and improve the flavour and texture of the food products. The oil thus becomes a TUFA! Most of our intake thus comes from hydrogenated vegetable oil used as an ingredient in processed foods and in the cooking of many convenience foods. Thus if you see the words "Hydrogenated" on labels, you know that it is bad news. I am not punting for Woolworths, but I notice that their food is labelled with the amount of TUFA.

TUFA has been found to be as bad, if not worse than saturated fatty acids. It raises the level of "bad" cholesterol (LDL) and lowers the level of the "good" cholesterol (HDL) thus leading to an increased risk of heart disease and stroke. It is also suspected that there is an association between TUFA and the number of patients with breast cancer, colon cancer and prostate cancer. The human brain consists of sixty percent fat and TUFA is suspected of playing a role in the thought processes of the brain and thus leading to Alzheimer's disease.

It is suggested that we limit our intake of TUFA to 5 grams per day. At present some people are consuming up to 26 grams per day!

Foods that contain substantial amounts of TUFA are:

- Pastry, pies and pasties, convenience foods such as ready meals
- Cake and cake mix, biscuits and crackers
- Hard margarine and shortening
- ❖ Fast foods such as burgers, chips and milkshake
- ❖ Takeaways such as fish and chips, Chinese, Indian and deep fried
- Pizza bases, crisps and other savoury snacks

The aforementioned information I gained from an article in "Update", the journal of continuing education for General Practitioners.

In the last few years the number of 50-year-old former disadvantaged people who have either High Blood Pressure and/or Diabetes has made an impression on me. I discussed this with Prof Reiner from Groote Schuur Hospital and to my surprise he knew about it and labelled it the "Coca-Cola Syndrome". He said that wherever you found Coca-Cola, you found fast foods – the cause of all the problems!

SPEAKER:

June introduced herself and Mr Manie.

SCHOOL is embarking on a programme to address these challenges by activating a menu of 'mindset

enhancing' initiatives at Lavender Hill Secondary School, our pilot school. We are confident that we have a workable 'plan of action', which we would like to pilot.

The Pilot Project Overall Plan divides into 4 categories

Develop YES school environment/ambiance

Develop empowering partnerships

Develop skills creation programme

Develop site and Infrastructure

Develop Y.E.S. SCHOOL ambience/environment - Create a safe, nurturing, positive, hygienic and enabling HAVEN where vulnerable youth caught in social 'crossfire' CHOOSE to spend their time. A place conducive to meaningful teaching and learning - which educators, learners, parents and community are proud of - and where 1100 teenagers **choose** to spend their time.

This includes: Branding, grounds-beautifying, positive messaging programme, development of music department and bands, School House development, Peer2Peer education development, development of matric privilege garden, homework classes, after-schools sports/cultural classes. Optimal use of ALL school facilities, physical and intellectual, to empower learners and parents Development of Socio/psycho intervention programs. Tracking team Bronwyn and Ivan Jones

Build on the t-shirt campaign. This year we are talking to our sponsors, HCI Foundation and Seardel about providing t-shirts in the colours of the 4 new school houses. We hope to turn these t-shirts into 'commitment/contracting' symbols, e.g. 'I commit to being the best that I can be' or 'YES I am a winner' maybe? Perhaps we will ask the kids to pay R10 as a sort of membership fee which will give the new houses

a bit of money in the kitty?

Develop empowering partnerships with learners, families, teachers, community members, other schools, corporates, Rotary, The Western Cape Education department, the City of Cape Town, the Western Cape government.

Develop skills-creation programme,

Start with Grade 8 afternoon 'finishing' school with the main areas of attention being computer literacy and nutrition. (Communiversity)

Like all Y.E.S. SCHOOL initiatives, this idea will be workshopped with educators and all stakeholders.

In my opinion unemployability is the root cause of the social problems in an area like Lavender Hill. For 40 years people have dropped out of school because of the 'working class' expectations imprinted on them.

I am very hopeful that basic computer literacy will also help to solve the very serious illiteracy challenge.

Develop Site & Infrastructure.

This section includes: a dirtbin/recycling/laundry yard; plaster/painting of pumphouse; 5-year maintenance of playing fields and equipment; tarring driveways and parking areas; roof-over big quad; upgrade feeding scheme kitchen to cater for whole school meals. Rebuild ablution blocks to include banks of showers and hot water. Install solar heating. Install rainwater harvesting systems. Build a school hall which is available to parents and primary schools, and maybe includes an Educare centre??.

When Jackie James wrote our first project proposal back in 2005, the project was called 'Lend a Hand in Lavender Hill' (inspired by RI's theme for the year – 'Lend a Hand'). The name has now changed to Y.E.S. Youth Empowerment through School, But the PRINCIPLES and the PRINCIPALS remain.

Developments and work being done now: mindset change; turning challenges into opportunities.
