
It boils down to the fact that most of the children born in this country, are born to under-privileged women and therefore, because of home circumstances, these new-born babies receive hardly any stimulation from adults. It has been proven over and over that the more babies are stimulated from birth; the better they do in their school years and later in life.

What Geoffrey Canada did in Brooklyn, New York, was to get a group of volunteers and organise them to have group meetings with parents and expectant parents to show and teach them how important it is for babies to be stimulated. These courses were usually held on Saturdays and held for nine sessions.

Statistics have shown that his results have indicated an improvement in the children of parents who attended these courses.

Where do we as Rotarians fit in? We are planning to start a similar course at the Retreat Community Health Centre. We already have the co-operation of the UCT Department of Family Medicine which seems keen on the project.

I am confident that it will take off and if it does, it could spread to all the other Rotary Clubs in the Peninsula and to the rest of South Africa.

#### **GUEST SPEAKER**

Mervyn introduced Kathryn Hoeflich who came with a very impressive and long CV. Kathryn seems to have travelled and / or worked in just about every country in the world.

**Asylum seeker**: A person who has lodged asylum application and is awaiting a decision **Refugee:** A person who flees persecution on 5 defined grounds. In RSA, has been granted status by Department of Home Affairs.

Distinctions between migrants and refugees:

- Migrants, especially economic migrants, **choose** to move in order to improve their lives.
- Refugees **have** to move if they are to save their lives or preserve their freedom.

Refugees have to have well founded fears, could be persecuted, unable to return or valid fears due to race, belief, politics, membership of a social group.

• Governments bear the prime responsibility for protecting refugees on their territory, and often do so in concert with NGOs and civil society.

- ▶ UNHCR works alongside NGOs and civil society to promote or provide legal and physical protection.
- ▶ Where services exist, refugees should be able to access the services instead of creating parallel services.
- ▶ Facilitation of local integration is a priority; self-reliance as well as promoting other solutions to refugees' plight
- ▶ South Africa is party to the International and Regional Refugee Instruments and has incorporated principles of international refugee law into national legislation ("no reservations") and thus offers opportunities for integration, especially socio-economic, not found in most African countries

SA's constitution affords refugees all the same protections as a citizen except: political rights, citizenship. The total number of Refugees is coming down and came down rapidly after 2008. SA has become known as an unfriendly country for refugees.

CTRC main areas of focus: Psychosocial Interventions, Education & Advocacy, Self-Reliance, Department of Social Development Programmes.

Kathryn's talk generated a large amount of questions and discussion. Bottom line: Xenophobia is alive and our Government services in this regard are "broken" (for want of a better expression!).

Graham thanked Kathryn for her informative talk.

#### **FAREWELL TO SARAH**

Sarah addressed the club and said how she had expected to make a change but her experience here has changed Sarah. She has loved being part of Wynberg Rotary Club, has found family, friends, service, experienced the culture, country and Cape Town.
