EDITORIAL

The following piece of FUN came about when I was recently helping my assistant's son write a summary of Shakespeare's "Merchant of Venice".

The somewhat dry nature of that assignment got me thinking about how the tabloid press of medieval Venice would have presented this rather gory trial to their readers, hence my personal adaptation/skewing of the facts:
