

Business Meeting:

Report back was done on the following:

Dirk – Khanyisa School. R12,000.00 of garden equipment to be spent. We received monies from District Grant to fund this. The School works on the Waldorf Education System. There are 70 students and 25 Teachers. The learners are taught life skills. They have a wish list which contains a number of items one being computers as the current ones are out dated. They still need to establish who the owners of the premises are.

Biffy – Isiphiwo School have been able to get Education Department to give R120,000.00 to extend the classroom. MOU was to be done between School and Wynberg. Building could be finished before end of the year. Teaching of educators by Beryl is going well and teachers are eager to learn.

Biffy – 2nd Global Grant for Victoria Hospital will be able to start (mainly working of the Physio Department) with the help of the Wynberg Rotartact when the report back to RI on the 1st Global Grant has been completed.

Pam – Victoria Hospital is a Government Hospital that sees over 800 000 people a year. The project that we have been busy with is the painting of the Psychiatric Department (Paint was donated) and the reorganising of the offices to be user friendly to the staff.

TAILPIECE

Manure... An interesting fact: In the 16th and 17th centuries, everything had to be transported by ship and it was also before the invention of commercial fertilizers, so large shipments of manure were quite common.



It was shipped dry, because in dry form it weighed a lot less than when wet, but once water (at sea) hit it, not only did it become heavier, but the process of fermentation began again, of which a by product is methane gas of course. As the stuff was stored below decks in bundles you can see what could (and did) happen.

Methane began to build up below decks and the first time someone came below at night



with a lantern, BOOOOM!

Several ships were destroyed in this manner before it was determined just what was happening

After that, the bundles of manure were always stamped with the instruction 'Stow high in transit' on them, which meant for the sailors to stow it high enough off the lower decks so that any water that came into the hold would not touch this volatile cargo and start the production of methane.



Thus evolved the term 'S.H.I.T', (Stow High In Transit) which has come down through the centuries and is in use to this very day.

You probably did not know the true history of this word.

Neither did I.

I had always thought it was a golf term....!
