SOLOISTS

Leah Gunter-soprano

Leah studied at the University of Stellenbosch, majoring in voice under Magdalena Oosthuizen, obtaining her BMus cum laude in 2013. In the same year, she attended master classes with the acclaimed tenor Kobie van Rensburg, and is currently enrolled as an MMus student under Prof. Virginia Davids, Prof. Hendrik Hofmeyr and Prof. Kamal Khan. She was awarded a number of bursaries as an undergraduate, and was the first first-year student to win the Mabel Quick Singing Competition. Leah was a finalist in the 2011 Muziqanto Singing Competition, the 2012 FMR/Pick 'n Pay Music Competition, and the 2012 National Grahamstown Music Competition, where she won



overall second prize and won the award for Best Vocalist. In 2013, she achieved 90% in the UNISA Grade 8 Singing examination.

Since graduating Leah has performed in public on many occasions and in November 2014 won the Schock Foundation prize at UCT as the best female vocalist.

In May 2015 Leah sang the role of Violetta in La Traviata (Verdi) performed at the Artscape Opera House. In November Leah performed in the Four: 30 Operas made in South Africa.

Stanislav Anguelov - accordion

After receiving his first accordion as a present from his parents at age five, Stanislav started formal accordion lessons at the age of eight in his native town Shumen (Bulgaria). At age ten he joined the Junior Accordion Orchestra. In 1984 he won a Gold Medal at the National Festival of Performing Arts in Bulgaria and in 1985 he was accepted at the Academy of Music and Dance in Plovdiv-Bulgaria, where he studied accordion with Prof. Peter Marinov and received a degree in accordion in 1991. He later taught at the "Constantine Preslavsky" University – Shumen. During this period Stanislav also took part in competitions and concerts in Bulgaria, France and Poland as a soloist or member of different ensembles or with the Accordion Orchestra.



 $In 1992\ Stanislav\ moved\ to\ Cape\ Town, where\ he\ performs,\ records\ and\ teaches.$

He has done recordings for the SABC, has been featured on the CDs of many South African artistes and released his solo album called "Stanislav" in 1997.

One of his many career highlights includes an invitation to perform at the Nelson Mandela 46664 concert held in the Green Point Stadium on 29 November 2003. He performed 2 songs "Say it is not true", where he accompanied Brian May and Roger Tailor from Queen and Dave Stewart and later in the program he played "Great Song of Indifference", where he accompanied Sir Bob Geldof. There were over 40 000 people in the stadium and the concert was broadcast to an estimated audience of three billion people, which made it the world's most widely distributed event.

ROTARY AT WORK

Norwegian Liaison Committee

The school project in Grassy Park/Lotus River, which works with 5 primary and 2 secondary schools, is now entering its 16th year. The goal of this project is to provide a better quality of education to thousands of learners on the Cape Flats.

Funds for the project come from the fundraising activities of the students and teachers of two Norwegian schools. All monies collected in Norway go directly to the schools via the Rotary Club of Wynberg.



This year R720 000 was given to more than 400 students from our schools in the form of bursaries, and we were also able to provide the schools with much-needed laptops and projectors.

To ensure the ongoing interest and enthusiasm of the donor schools, Wynberg Rotary each year hosts groups of teachers and learners from Norway. These representatives meet with our South African students and teachers and learn from first-hand experience what a difference their contributions make to the lives of others.



Lavender Hill High School

Wynberg Rotary Club is proud to continue its involvement with Lavender Hill High School. This has to be one of THE success stories of the Western Cape with vastly improved Matric and University pass rates.

During the past year we gave the school's sports fields a much needed boost, after they had been damaged during construction of the school hall. A revamped water pump, several new sprinklers and the fields are once again

looking good, used by many in the community.

We have also renewed our association with SeaHouses Rotary Club (England), one of the original sponsors of the school fields. They provided a grant for a computer and library books, and we have re-stocked the library with some much needed additions. At the same time we have been involved with modernising the school website, and training the media group in website development and maintenance. This will help provide work skills for school leavers.



Victoria Hospital

Victoria Hospital is a government hospital and has a very limited budget. Two Departments vital to rehabilitation that are so often overlooked on budgets, because they are seen as needing "small items" and often items called "non-essential", are the Physiotherapy Department and the Occupational Therapy Departments. This year we have assisted these two departments via a Rotary Global Grant in partnership with Nittedal Rotary club. We also supplied

the theatre with a number of surgical probes that were badly needed.

A "hands-on " project was also undertaken at Victoria Hospital last year. Our club was asked by the hospital's CEO, Dr. Melvin Moodley, to help brighten up the lives of the doctors and patients in the Psychiatry Department by sprucing up their very dreary, rundown office/interview accommodation.

Firstly, the walls of the department's three offices were prepared and painted a beautiful, "Georgian" green. Our WRC resident woodwork genius (when not wearing his other hat as our resident design genius!), John Vivian, hand-made two solid pine wall desks, shelving and a table with a "turned" leg! WRC also provided a couple of notice boards, four new office chairs on wheels, and cushions to brighten up their patient seating.

Happily the doctors and staff were delighted with the results!

Library Corner Project

This project, which the Wynberg Rotary Club initiated last year, has progressed at a rapid rate. Ten library corners have been delivered to Lotus River Primary School in the past five months.

Each installation, from Grade R to Grade 3, consists of a specially designed folding bookcase on wheels and a carpet or mat for learners to sit on, for each classroom. We have also provided about 100 age-



appropriate books and puzzles per grade. The bookcase can be wheeled between the various grade classes to allow the teachers to rotate the books during the year.

The library corners are bright and colourful and the learners are encouraged by their teachers to read during break time, after school and during class time once they have completed their set assignments. As a result reading has become a prized reward.

This project is simple and can be easily replicated in other schools sowatch this space!!

THE TRADITION OF "PROMS"

The "Proms" were started in London in 1895. Concerts were expensive in those days and not many people could afford to attend. Most people were only able to hear good music when they went for walks in the public parks, where Promenade concerts were held with orchestras and bands playing on open-air bandstands.

Robert Newman, who at the time organized concerts in the famous Queen's Hall in London, decided to start a series of concerts which less wealthy people could attend.

He wanted to start a series of "promenade concerts" in the hall (in French "se promener" means "to walk"). The idea was that people could have standing places at a reasonable cost, with seats for the people who could afford to pay more. To this day there are two places in the Royal Albert Hall to prom: downstairs in the arena and upstairs in the gallery, with a standing ticket costing just £5.

Robert Newman knew a very good young conductor named Henry Wood, who he invited to conduct the Proms.

The Queen's Hall was destroyed by bombs in 1941, after which the Proms concerts were moved to the Royal Albert Hall. Henry Wood conducted almost all of the Proms for fifty years, until just before his death in 1944.

There is now a Prom held every evening for two months during the summer, with the last night called the "Last Night of the Proms".

Over the years people attending the Last Night of the Proms have tended to dress up in outlandish clothing and carry flags etc. For our Cape Town version of these concerts most of the audience wear boater hats and celebrate the superb music with balloons, streamers and a street party at interval.
