Nuclear Power for South Africa

South Africa plans to have six new nuclear power plants by 2030 and Reuters reports that it will, cost between R400 billion and R1 trillion to build them. It is expected that there will be a more accurate estimate before construction begins. However it is worth noting the problems of budgeting and delays that have plagued both Britain and France with their nuclear expansion.

It was recently admitted that Britain's first atomic power station in 10 years, in Hinkley Point, has hit problems. It was originally scheduled to open in 2017 but, due to delays, will probably not open before 2024. It was also estimated that the starting rate of £92,50 per megawatt hour of power is more than double the current wholesale rate.

The nuclear plant in Flamanville, France, has gone three times over budget and fallen 6 years behind schedule. South Africa was far more efficient with Medupi. The first 800 MW unit was completed and handed over to Eskom Generation on 23 August 2015 (only 3 years late). Units 5 to 1 will be completed at approximately nine-month intervals. The power station was initially expected to cost R80 billion (2007 Rands) but is now forecast to cost R154 billion (2013 Rands)

Germany recently decided to go out of nuclear energy to focus on growing the renewable energy industry. It is the first time a highly industrialised country has decided to give it up. Germany has set itself an "ambitious target of 35 years to increase the energy mix from 30% to 80% of renewable energy".

Even after 60 years of nuclear power, there is no solution for safe, long-term storage of radioactive waste anywhere in the world. The most hazardous waste needs to be stored securely for hundreds of thousands of years before it can be considered safe. The strictest control of the movement and storage of the waste could be considered almost as critical as the safety of the plant itself.

It has not yet been made clear, to South Africans, what the current safety assessments of the proposed nuclear programmes are, along with why nuclear power is preferable to renewable energy investments. No doubt, these assessments will been made public and our questions will soon be answered.

"Greenpeace" asserts that a nuclear plant takes more than a decade to build, is dependent on a non-renewable resource, creates dangerous radioactive waste and is very costly. In contrast, renewable energy capacity can be built much faster, and without any of the safety, environmental, and financial risks associated with nuclear power.
