Adriana Marais a postdoctoral theoretical physicist is one of 5 South Africans on the shortlist of 100 potential candidates from a global application list of more than 200,000. Due to the harsh conditions the new Martians would not survive more than 2 minutes in the open air so would spend their days in spacesuits or living units to isolate them from the radiation, carbon dioxide levels and atmospheric pressure. Other than scientific experiments how will they pass the time without going mad for as much as they try, they can't totally erase memories of where they have come from, what they have done and experienced and therefore what they are missing?

So, will the words of Nelson Mandela - "it always seems impossible until it is done" — be sufficient to keep the new Martians motivated, proud and sane enough to not end up being driven mad before they comprehend their actual vulnerability in a harsh unknown environment? "In that moment I made peace with possibly never returning to Earth, giving up everything I know and love, and living out my days on another planet," she says. "We are all naturally curious explorers, seeking new experiences and new knowledge. I think if we stop exploring, we may lose touch with what it is to be human," she says.

There are many other questions of course – Won't you go crazy? What do your parents feel? What about procreation on Mars? etc, etc.
