ELON MUSK

After the ground breaking event of the week: the successful launch of the huge Falcon Heavy rocket, we look at the instigator – ex-South African, Elon Musk

Whatever you've wanted to achieve in life, Elon Musk has probably already done it. The Pretoria-born entrepreneur has had one of the greatest engineering careers in modern history, drawing comparisons with Da Vinci, Einstein and Iron Man himself, Tony Stark.

He sold his first code at the age of 12

Musk taught himself computer programming at age 10, and when he was 12, he sold his first code for a BASIC-based video game called *Bastar* to *PC and Office Technology* magazine, earning him \$500.

He left university after just two days

Musk enrolled in Stanford University to study physics, but after a mere two days he reconsidered and dropped out in order to apply himself to the Internet boom. He founded his first company, Zip2, which was an online newspaper, mapping and business directory and sold it for \$307 million in 1999.

He reduced the cost of reaching the International Space Station by 90% As part of his dream to eventually bring ordinary people to space, Musk's SpaceX project has reduced the cost of reaching the International Space Station from \$1 billion to \$60 million – a 90% cut!

He takes home a \$1 dollar salary per year from Tesla

Along with other high-profile executives, Musk joined the Giving Pledge – a commitment by the world's wealthiest individuals to donate the majority of their wealth to philanthropy. The Pledge was created by Bill Gates and Warren Buffet in 2010 and ever since, Musk has received a mere \$1 salary from Tesla in addition to donating 50% of his net worth to philanthropic causes.

Here are some of his inspirational quotes:

"Failure is an option here. If things are not failing, you are not innovating enough."

"Persistence is very important. You should not give up unless you are forced to give up."

"If something is important enough, even if the odds are against you, you should still do it."

"People work better when they know what the goal is and why. It is important that people look forward to coming to work in the morning and enjoy working."

"Really pay attention to negative feedback and solicit it, particularly from friends. ... Hardly anyone does that, and it's incredibly helpful."

Guest Speaker President's	Warren Witte runs Integrated Aerial Systems, a company operating small sophisticated drones, used mainly in local industries – agriculture, mining, construction, land surveying and film production. An electric multi-rotor unit costs some R20 000 and comes equipped with gyro stabilizers, compass, GPS, HD camera and gimbals. It also has obstacle detection facilities and a back-to-home failsafe mechanism if things go wrong! For marine conservation, surveillance of the Cape Coast has reduced abalone poaching by 80%, but it needs to be routinely conducted, and personal risk is high. There are understandable concerns about privacy and safety, so drones need to be handled responsibly. Karen introduced and thanked the most interesting speaker.
