West division (4yrs)

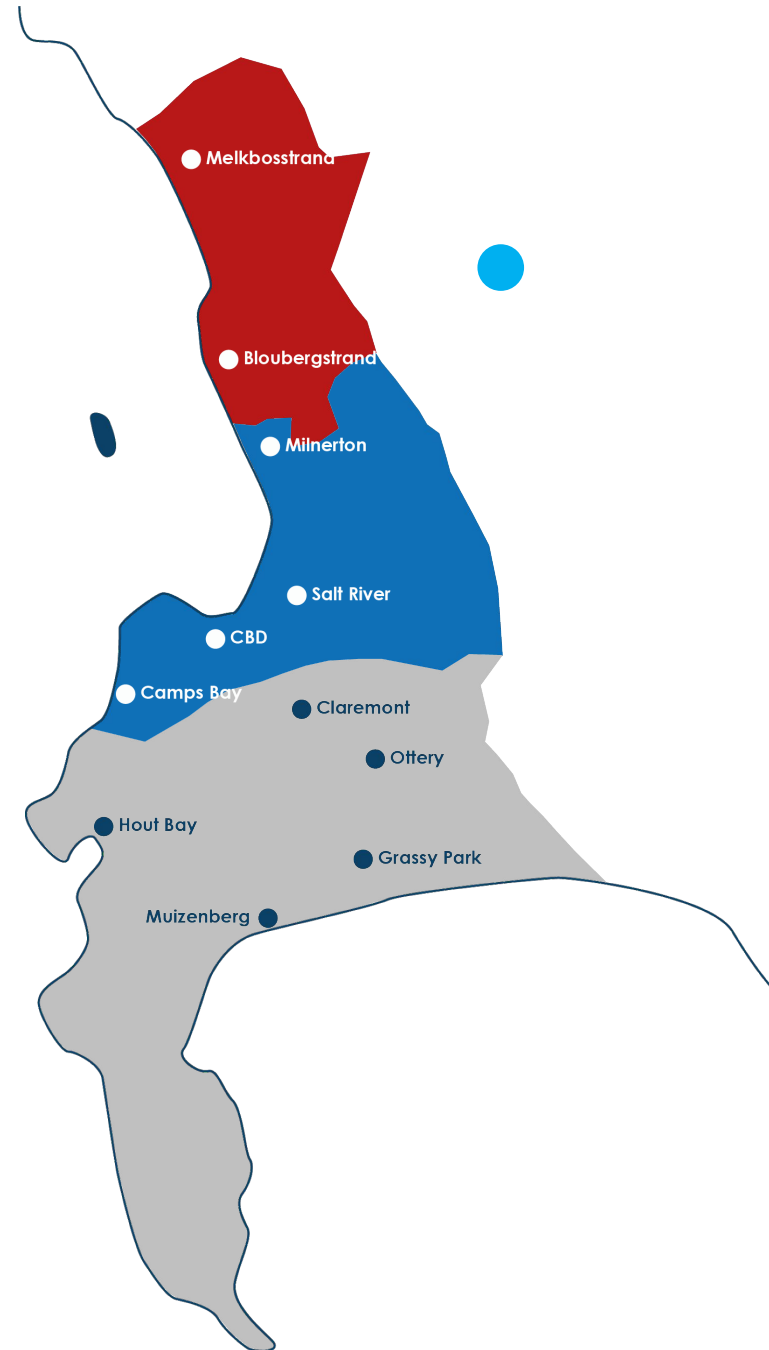
- Milnerton to Melkbosstrand

Dispatch division


- Based within the department of health control center at tygerberg.

How do we do it? In basic terms

1. Through 80 volunteers based in and around our communities, that are actively serving calls, whether they are on or off duty

2. World Class dispatching team that work behind the scenes to ensure all calls are managed from start to finish

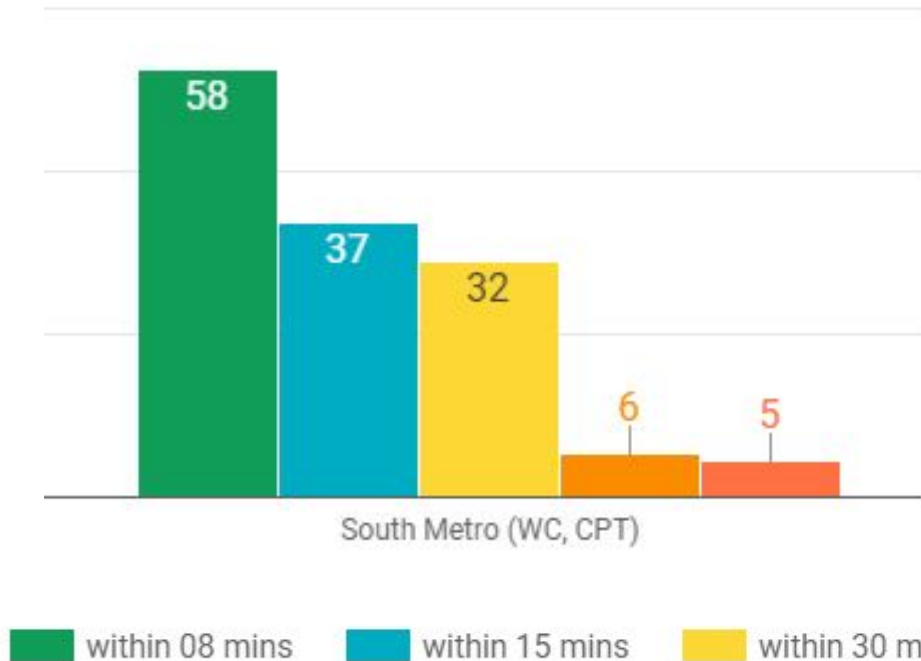


Why do we do it?

To provide rapid response in medical emergencies in South Africa, thereby closing the gap between those who can't afford private services and those who can. This in turn relieves the burden placed on state and private services to ensure a faster response.

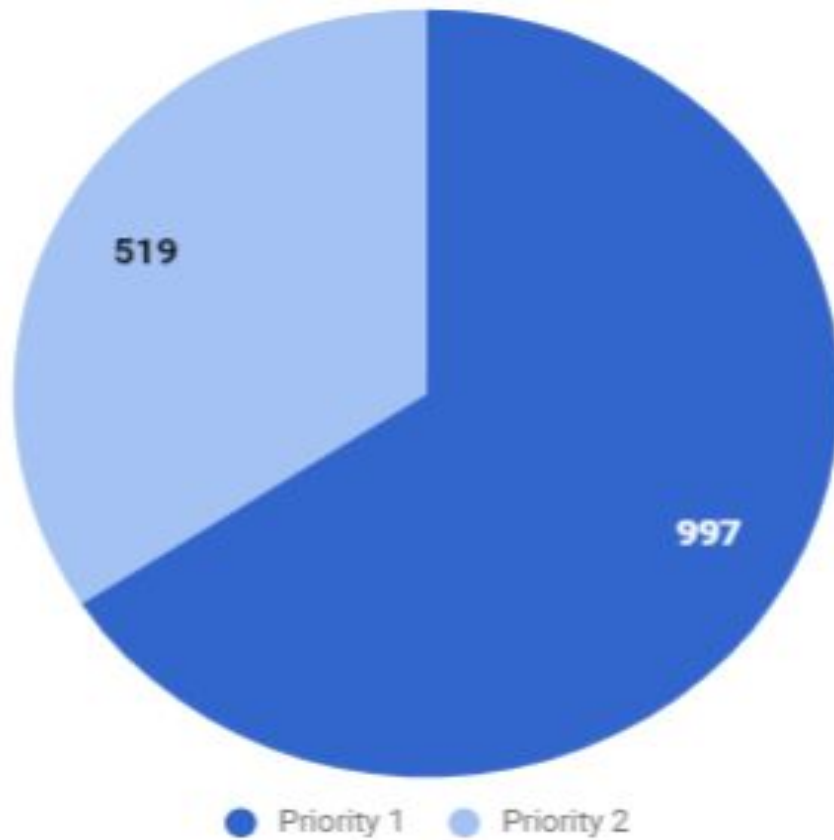
Our Current situation

Even though our Southern Division has no vehicle



42% of the time we are arriving at patients within 8 minutes or less. Our department of health is only reaching patients within 15 minutes, 62% of the time.

39% of these calls are people declining transport, which means that we are freeing up ambulances that can provide transport to more people in need

Our responders are often the difference between life and death for these patients

What do we need to make this happen

The EFAR system is an adaptable, low-cost and scalable prehospital emergency care system designed specifically for **communities in low and middle-income countries**.

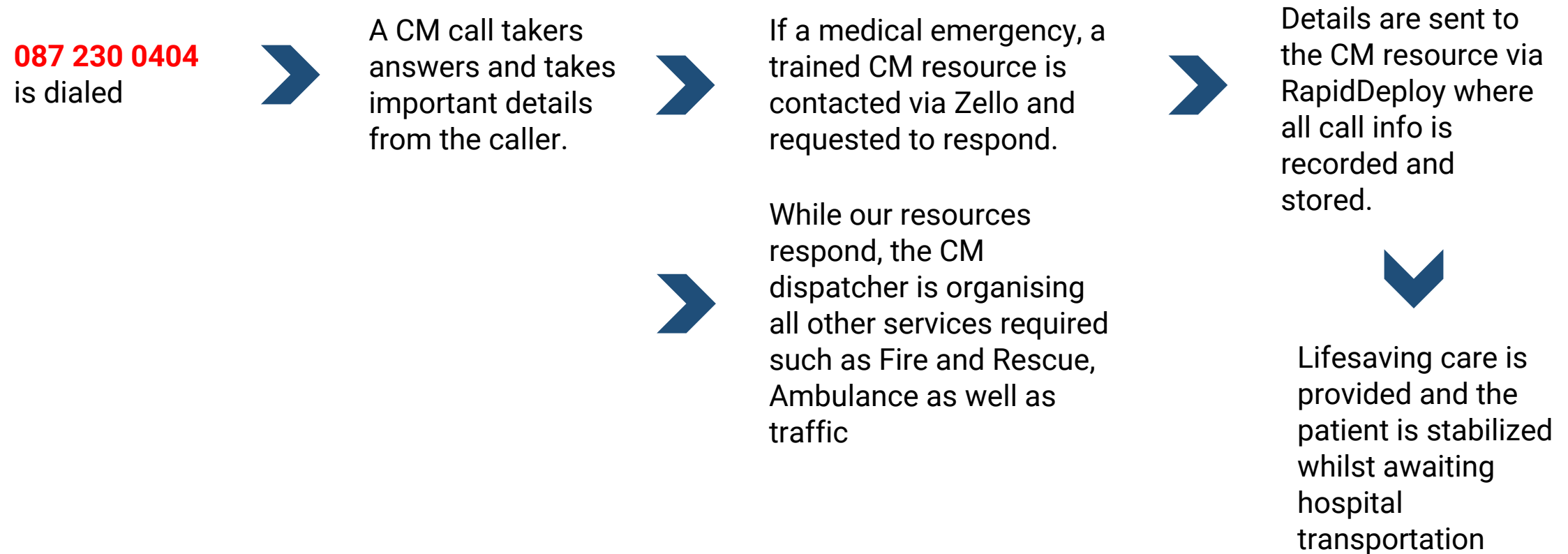
- EFAR is a 100% Community oriented first aid course.
- Developed and established by Metro and Provincial Government in conjunction with UCT and the University of Stellenbosch to upskill and uplift pervious disadvantaged communities.
- The programme is run on behalf of province by selected NGO's; Community Medics being one of them.
- All training and materials are supplied to the candidates at NO charge and all financial obligations are absorbed by Community Medics.

Our technology

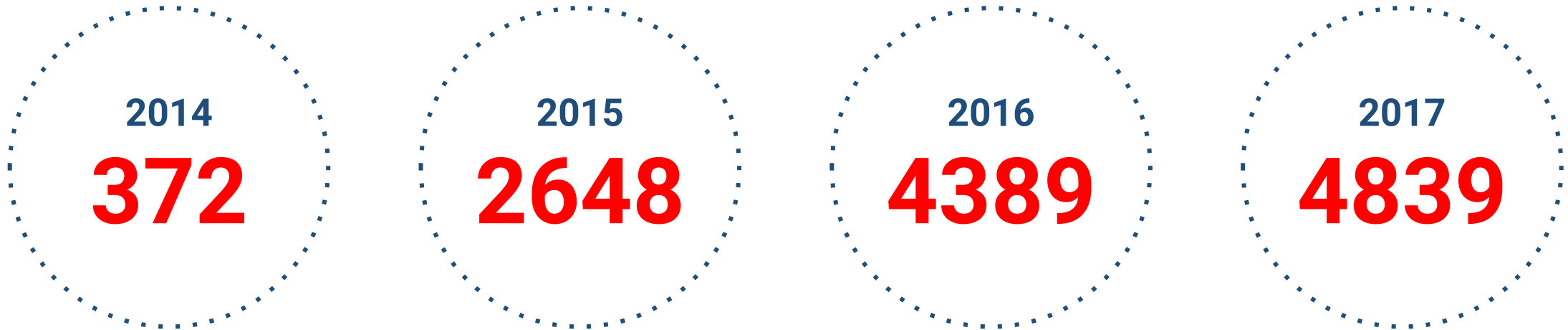


Push-to-talk

A web based workforce management and computer aided dispatch system that relays all information to medics and first responders to ensure response times are maintained and appropriate resources are utilised. RapidDeploy provides accurate reporting on call outs – daily/weekly/monthly etc.

Training Program Goals

Through training we can empower those in our communities to not only save lives, but assist to provide emergency care to those that need it the most.

Target for 2018/2019

- 15 Newly trained EFAR members within each division
- Total of 45 newly trained and integrated members
- Training and skilling of 4 dispatchers
- Continual upskill training to current members who do not have the financial resources to provide themselves.
 - 5 Higher level First Aid level three qualifications provided.
 - 5 BLS for healthcare providers courses offered
