THE SANTA SHOEBOX PROJECT



Irené Pieters is a woman who works non-stop and sets herself almost impossible goals.

After being diagnosed with osteoarthritis, Irené Pieters's career came to an abrupt halt. But every cloud has a silver lining. Marchelle Abrahams chatted to her about her first passion and second career.

After a 25-year-long career as a sports physiotherapist, Irené Pieters had no choice but to retire as a result of osteoarthritis in her hands.

"I was devastated at the time, but it gave me a chance to pursue my passion for charity," says the creative mind behind the Santa Shoebox Project.

The initiative, now in its 11th year, has grown from strength to strength under Pieters' guidance. The project, which started out as 180 boxes in Cape Town, has managed to double its numbers every year.

The seed is planted

Her passion for helping those in need led Pieters to a charity group called From The Children To The Children, as a volunteer. Not content with just helping out on a volunteer basis, she wanted to do more.

And then came her light-bulb moment: "I was inspired by an idea of the founder of the group - to distribute gifts at Christmas time to underprivileged children."

She was then appointed project leader for what was to become the Santa Shoebox Project. The initiative distributed 2000 boxes instead of the planned 600 in its first year.

Current numbers are sitting on a distribution of 100 000 gifts to underprivileged children per year across South Africa and Namibia.

To infinity and beyond

Pieters says the hard work didn't stop there - the Santa Shoebox Project has now set a target of reaching a million under-privileged children by 2019.

"In 2012 I decided to cap the target at 100 000, which greatly assisted with planning and especially the logistics. We have been doing 100 000 for the past four years."

She seems unperturbed by the mention of a million. "I believe we have the experience, the resources and the support of all of South Africa, so there is no stopping this March to a Million."

EVANSTON, III. Just a month ago Rotary announced nearly \$100 million in grants to support the global effort to end polio, a vaccine-preventable disease that once paralyzed hundreds of thousands of children each year.

The announcement comes as Nigeria marks two years without any reported cases of wild poliovirus, following four reported cases in 2016.

Rotary has committed to raising \$50 million a year to be matched 2-to-1 by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, yielding \$450 million for polio eradication activities over a three-year period. To date, Rotary has contributed more than \$1.8 billion to fight the disease, including matching funds from the Gates Foundation, and countless volunteer hours since launching its polio immunization program, PolioPlus, in 1985. In 1988, Rotary became a core partner in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative with the WHO, UNICEF, and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The Gates Foundation later joined. Since the initiative launched, the incidence of polio has plummeted by more than 99.9 percent, from about 350,000 cases in 1988 to 22 confirmed in 2017.
