

The History of Valentine's Day

"St. Valentine's Day began as a liturgical celebration of one or more early Christian saints named <u>Valentinus</u>. The most popular <u>martyrology</u> associated with Saint Valentine was that he was imprisoned for performing <u>weddings</u> for soldiers who were forbidden to marry and for ministering to Christians, who were <u>persecuted under the Roman Empire</u>. During his imprisonment, he is said to have healed the daughter of his jailer, Asterius. Legend states that before his execution he wrote her a letter "from your Valentine" as a farewell.

Today, Saint Valentine's Day is an official <u>feast day</u> in the <u>Anglican Communion</u>, as well as in the <u>Lutheran Church</u>. The <u>Eastern Orthodox Church</u> also celebrates Saint Valentine's Day, albeit on <u>July 6th</u> and <u>July 30th</u>, the former date in honour of the Roman <u>presbyter</u> Saint Valentine, and the latter date in honour of Hieromartyr Valentine, the Bishop of Interamna (modern Terni).

The day was first associated with <u>romantic love</u> in the circle of <u>Geoffrey Chaucer</u> in the <u>High Middle Ages</u>, when the tradition of <u>courtly love</u> flourished. By the 15th century, it had evolved into an occasion in which <u>lovers</u> expressed their love for each other by presenting flowers, offering <u>confectionery</u>, and sending <u>greeting cards</u> (known as "*valentines*"). Valentine's Day symbols that are used today include the <u>heart-shaped</u> outline, doves, and the figure of the winged <u>Cupid</u>. Since the 19th century, handwritten valentines have given way to mass-produced <u>greeting cards</u>."

The Catholic Church recognizes at least three different saints named Valentine or Valentinus, all of whom were martyred. One legend contends that Valentine was a priest who served during the third century in Rome. When Emperor Claudius II decided that single men made better soldiers than those with wives and families, he outlawed marriage for young men. Valentine, realizing the injustice of the decree, defied Claudius and continued to perform marriages for young lovers in secret. When Valentine's actions were discovered, Claudius ordered that he be put to death.
