EDITORIAL

Eat from a red plate and lose weight?!

According to research published in the journal *Appetite*, people who eat off red-coloured plates can cut their food intake by up to 40 per cent. Researchers found that serving meals on red plates or drinking from red cups can cut consumption by almost half, and suggest that this is due to associations with the colour red. Commonly linked to the idea of 'danger, prohibition and stop', researchers say the colour red may encourage diners to avoid snacking.

Red appears to act as a subtle 'stop sign' in the mind, working at a level below conscious awareness. Study co-authors Oliver Genschow and Leonie Reutner, doctoral students in psychology at the University of Basel in Switzerland, believe colour "is an important factor to consider when aiming to reduce consumption of unhealthy food and beverages".

As part of the study, 41 male students were asked to drink iced tea from cups marked either with red or blue labels. Findings showed that when they drank from the cups with the red labels, they drank 44 per cent less. Regardless of whether they liked the taste or not, they drank more of three different flavours of iced teas from a cup with a blue label on it. In the second part of the study, 109 people (both genders) were asked to complete a psychology survey, and told they could snack on pretzels while doing it. No differences in hunger levels were found among the participants and they were given ten pretzels each on red, blue and white plates. People ate the most pretzels off the blue plate, the second most from the white one, and the least off the red plate.

The study goes on to suggest that governments as well as the food industry could use red packaging on unhealthy foods as a deterrent – and could even use more red in restaurants and bars to prevent people drinking too much.
